




opportunities to our members and one of our goals for this semester is to expand on these events.

As a chapter, we are thankful to be situated minutes away from these spaces, providing our members with the unique opportunity to support the care of our local Chapel Hill community

For instance, a fifteen minute walk down from the center of UNC's campus brings us to the UNC Blood Donation Center, a large blood bank supplying UNC Medical Center patients. In encouraging the awareness of platelet need and active donation, we hold a service event centered around platelet donation: Puppies & Platelets. Held in the center of our campus, our members are joined by a representative of the UNC Blood Donation Center and several adorable puppies! Typically held in late spring or early fall, puppies chase each other around the event space, drawing students as they walk to-and-from classes in the warm weather. As students come to meet the puppies, our AED members provide information about platelet donation, such as donor scarcity, platelet use, and the process of

As donating blood/platelets is also a service event for AED members, many share their personal experiences as donors, detailing the relative ease of the process while emphasizing its value. A source of joy for both members and students alike, Puppies and Platelets serves the dual purpose of increasing platelet donation awareness as well as supporting student wellbeing.

Another 10 minute drive places us at the Student Health Action Coalition, the oldest student-run free clinic in the United States. Last November, we partnered with this organization, holding a SHAC 5K and Health Fair to raise funds and awareness in support of SHAC. In the brisk morning air, over 50 AED members joined medical students, volunteers, and community donors to set up booths, tables, and race stations, preparing to cheer on the racers that would speed by. With the sun rising behind, our AED volunteers traced the path forward for runners, undercutting the morning chill with their cheers and bright posters. With the support of community donors and incredible partners, the SHAC 5K was successful in supporting SHAC's free health services, which serve uninsured and underinsured neighbors in Chapel Hill, Carrboro, and Durham.

Along with serving our Chapel Hill community, UNC AED strives to create a community of inclusivity and belonging. In ensuring AED feels welcome to all, we hold social opportunities geared toward the wide range of personalities and interests represented, ranging from study dates and ice cream socials to Mountain Weekends and formals. Whether it be runins at the library, advice about an organic chemistry exam, or rides to the airport, our AED members are endlessly generous with their kindness and support, continuing to build what we are proud to call our "UNC AED Family".

### **IMPORTANT REMINDERS**

### EIN (Employer Identification Number) and Tax Exempt Status and Filing Your Tax Return

National Treasurer

Alpha Epsilon Delta is a 501(c)(3) tax exempt educational organization. The Society is also designated as a charity. The Internal Revenue Service states that "The issuance of an EIN to a nonprofit organization is separate and distinct from the organization's actually obtaining tax-exempt status from the IRS. Each chapter of a national non-profit organization must have its own EIN, but the central organization may file for a group tax exemption." This statement means that each subordinate (chapter) of AED must have a unique EIN. The IRS recognizes the chapters (subordinates) listed by AED on a list submitted to the IRS and updated yearly. Your chapter must be on the list to be recognized as a part of AED and thus exempt from Federal Income tax.

Chapters cannot use the parent organization's EIN nor can they use the EIN of their university. It is the parent organization that holds the tax exempt status. The tax exempt status of the parent organization extends to each subordinate unit in good standing with the IRS. To be in good standing with the IRS the subordinate must file a tax return each year. Failure to file the tax return for 3 years results in the subordinate unit losing its tax exempt status. Once tax exemption has been lost, the chapter must apply for reinstatement of its tax exempt status. Loss of the tax exempt status subjects the chapter to Federal Income tax and filing the long Form 990. In addition to loss of tax exempt status the chapter may also be subject to penalties and interest on back taxes. Chapters are required by federal law to file a tax return on the 15th day of the 5th month after the close of its fiscal year. For most chapters the fiscal year begins on January 1 and ends on December 31.

The fiscal year is set when the chapter first applies for the EIN. Filing a tax return is easy. A few years ago the IRS established the e-Postcard (Form 990N). It is a very simple form that is filled out and submitted online.

AED is also classified as a charity under section 509 (a)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code. Contributions to your chapter are deductible under section 170 of the Code. Your chapter is qualified to receive tax deductible bequests, devises, transfers or gifts under section 2055, 2106, and 2522 of the Internal Revenue Code.

Tax-exempt, charitable, non-profit organizations, and EINs

The issuance of an EIN to a non-profit organization is separate and distinct from the organization's actually obtaining tax-exempt status from the IRS. Each chapter of a national non-profit organization must have its own EIN, but the central organization may file for a group tax exemption. Before donating monies to a charity, it is advisable to verify its proper registration and IRS Form 990 tax-exempt status. The entire database is searchable, and one can verify an entity's registration, status, and assets and liabilities registered in private databases.

All IRS Form 990-registered charities must obtain proper registration via the Internal Revenue Service. Another source for verifying an entity's tax-exempt status is the IRS, itself.

## REFLECTIONS OF A NATIONAL MEMBER'S JOURNEY BEFORE MEDICAL SCHOOL

Whether it is the priceless bonds you form with peers or the invaluable privilege of investing in the countless student journeys entrusted in your care, many joys come with serving in a leadership position. Nevertheless, fully committing to any leadership role requires earnestly receiving every challenge that comes with it. Indeed, storms are inevitable in our lives, even more so when we answer the call to serve in a leadership capacity. Yet, my formative experiences in Alpha Epsilon Delta (AED) have equipped me with the resilience to weather any storm. Moreover, it has provided me with a lifelong community that reminds me that we need not brave these storms alone.

The unexpected rise of the COVID-19 pandemic was one such storm that shook every aspect of our lives, and student organizations were no exception. While necessary, given the times, measures like social distancing and virtual forms of involvement undoubtedly minimized our sense of interconnectedness. However, even when a return to some degree of normalcy seemed to be on the horizon, members still struggled to engage and relate like before the pandemic. The united present-ness and personal connections that were so vital for the life of our chapter's community were undeniably impaired, and it weighed heavily on our hearts mine and my fellow leaders.
